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## New technology helps autistic kids communicate better

Video games and specialized exercises are two methods helping autistic children communicate better.

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Here is a truly startling statistic: the number of kids born with autism increases 10-to-17 percent each year.

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We all know the challenges those diagnosed face when it comes to simply communicating with others. Now, new technologies are bridging that gap faster than you might imagine.

Simply speaking is just one way to communicate, but interaction may be a better option, especially for kids with autism.

Maria Jose Rodrigues Fortiz of System Informatics at University of Granada said, "It's a system to help people communicate with another people."

This "scout" program in Spain relies on special video gaming systems like this Nintendo DS. Kids can learn basic tasks, as well as telling teachers what they want to do, all by touching this screen. A study in 16 Spanish schools found the program decreased outbursts and improved overall behavior.

Fortiz said, "They are less aggressive because they can communicate."

The 20 "brain balance" centers in the US offer a slightly different approach.

Dr. Mark Goldenberg, Executive Director at Brain Balance Center in Norwalk, CT, said, "The fundamental issue in these kids is that both hemispheres are not linking up."

Emily Kissa has a form of sensory processing disorder - one brain hemisphere is weaker than the other.

Doctor Goldenberg uses special goggles and exercise to stimulate her vision, balance and hearing. The goal: to strengthen that weakness through therapy three times a week and better nutrition.

Wendy Sue Kissa, Emily's mother, said, "We feel like she's really come a very long way and sort of gotten to the place we thought she could get to."

Emily's mom sees the method maturing quickly now the millions with autism using modern technology to develop them in the modern world.

Researchers say video games and robots work better for kids because they are more predictable and consistent than humans.

BACKGROUND: Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a range of complex neurodevelopment disorders, characterized by social impairments, communication difficulties, and restricted, repetitive, and stereotyped patterns of behavior. Autistic disorder, sometimes called autism or classical ASD, is the most severe form of ASD. It varies widely in severity and symptoms and may go unrecognized, especially in mildly affected children or when it's masked by more debilitating handicaps. Health care providers will often use a questionnaire or other screening instrument to gather information about a child's development and behavior. There is no cure for ASD. Therapies and behavioral interventions are designed to remedy specific symptoms and can bring about substantial improvement. The ideal treatment plan coordinates therapies and interventions that meet the specific needs of individual children. WAIT, YOU WANT MY CHILD TO PLAY VIDEO GAMES?: Researchers around the world are creating video games to study cognitive skills in children with autism using a revolutionary interface: gesture recognition software that registers the players' movements and transfers them to the screen. The programs use photos, sounds and positive feedback as part of a scoring system to encourage autistic children to learn. At issue is the importance of developing personal relationships and becoming a part of society. While video games can be educational and entertaining, their reputation as a solitary activity can present an impediment to progress for people with autistic disorders by limiting their exposure to social situations.
